This will be my last letter for our *Changing Lives* newsletter. I sometimes find it hard to believe I have been writing these for nearly 25 years, sharing the stories of lives changed. During this time, we have tried to keep Jesus at the center of this ministry, as Christ's love for us is what motivates us to love all who come through our doors. We have an intern program where people come for several weeks and work alongside and learn from us about helping people experiencing homelessness. A recent class of interns had this to say about their experience here:

- Handling difficult moments with patience and remembering the trauma of the people we work with

"In our Bridge program we had a single mother with a young child who had disabilities. The mother had become homeless because there was no care or support for her son, so she could not work. As she came into the program, she was forceful in her approach with the staff and could be hard to work with. The

Over the course of two months, the mother saw something different here and began to relax, trust and engage. The staff was able to walk alongside her and help her navigate the challenges she was facing. When she left Bridge a few months later, they had secured

care for her son, which allowed the mother to work, and then obtain housing."

"Many years ago, I was helping a participant study for the GED, and he shared all the criticisms he had of me, personally and professionally. As I listened, I remember thinking, 'I know his story. He has seen everyone he loved leave him because of his actions, and I bet he's wondering if I'm going to do that too. I wonder what might happen if I just listen, stay connected to him through this and speak honestly to him?' So that's what I did. I said, 'I really want to keep working with you because I think you can accomplish a lot of incredible things during your time here, but I am getting the sense that you are trying to push me away with all these things you are bringing up. I want you to know that I'm committed to hearing as much as you want to share, and it doesn't change my commitment to working with you. Are you willing to continue working with me even with all my
